General Laws and Regulations

Tribal permits/licenses are valid on *Tribal & Trust lands only*. They are *not* valid on SDGFP Game Production Areas, Walk-In Areas or Waterfowl Production Areas.

No license may be refunded or transferred after being issued.

No one may discharge firearms within 660 feet of any occupied dwelling, school or any public establishment or where livestock are present without the express written permission of owner or occupant.

No person shall scare, chase, harass, disperse, rally or otherwise disturb any wildlife by means other than by legal hunting methods and in the ordinary course of hunting.

No more than (20) twenty persons shall cooperate as a group in hunting.

Youth 12 thru 15 years of age must possess a hunter safety card or certification of completion from a hunter safety course prior to acquiring any tribal hunting permit.

No one may wantonly waste any game.

No person shall abandon edible portions of fish or wildlife at a meat processing plant. The leaving of edible portions of fish or wildlife at a processing plant of more than ninety (90) days shall be considered prima facie evidence of a violation. The owner(s) or operator(s) in charge of any meat processing plant shall report the violation to the Tribal Fish and Wildlife Department.

Non-Member hunting permits are issued on a first come first served basis. Applications are available upon request.

The sportsman license available to SWO Tribal Members only grants the same privileges as any other SWO license. It does not include any big game licenses (deer or turkey). Big Game licenses must be purchased individually.

Big Game permits are issued through the Tribal Fish & Wildlife Office only. Fishing licenses and other permits are available at the Dakota Connection C Store, Agency C Store and Oshays casino in Waubay or online site.

Federal Lacey Act. No person may transport or ship to another state wildlife taken unlawfully on the Lake Traverse Reservation.

INSPECTION: Any motor vehicle, camper or trailer may be stopped for such inspection and count at the request of any person authorized to enforce the game & fish laws of the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate. You may not refuse inspection and count of game or inspection of firearm.

No person shall deface, mutilate, shoot at, tear, pull down or destroy any sign on the reservation.

No person shall cut, run through, tear out, take down, and leave down any fence. Nor leave any gates open or in any way destroy gates or fences on the reservation.

No person may intentionally interfere with another person lawfully engaged in taking or attempting to take game or fish. No person may scare or disturb game with specific intent to prevent its lawful taking.

It shall be unlawful for any person to chase, drive, harass, or hunt any wildlife with or from a motorized vehicle (automobile, snowmobile, ATV, etc.).

It shall be unlawful to have any loaded firearm in a vehicle/recreation vehicle, except while sitting still and hunting from a boat.

No person(s) Indian or Non-Indian are allowed to hunt on the posted special management areas on Tribal Trust Land.

General Laws and Regulations

No hunting allowed on Lake Traverse Reservation trust lands on the North Dakota side unless a special permit is acquired from the SWO Fish & Wildlife Department through a separate application process. These special permits are available on a first come basis. They are limited permits exclusive for North Dakota Trust lands only.

North Dakota Trust land seasons differ from South Dakota Trust land seasons. Refer to North Dakota Trust Lands Season Fact Sheet.

Non member licensees whom were issued regular permits are not allowed to hunt Indian lands on the North Dakota side of the Lake Traverse Reservation.

Non member tribally licensed waterfowl hunters are not allowed to hunt from boats on waters the State of South Dakota deems to be meandered waters. Check with the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate Fish & Wildlife Department prior to hunting from a boat to ensure they are allowed on that particular body of water.

It is illegal to use an auto-loading or self-loading firearm capable of holding more than six cartridges or capable of being operated as a full automatic.

Persons illegally taking, killing or possessing any species of fish or wildlife shall be liable for a civil liability to the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate.

If a person is convicted of violating any law or regulation pertaining to fishing, hunting, or possessing fish or wildlife without a license or during closed season, the court may revoke the persons hunting, trapping or fishing privileges for a period of one or more years.

Hunting or fishing violations on tribal trust lands that violate Tribal Game & Fish laws may also result in a Federal violation.

No person shall send or receive a message by radio or any other wireless means of communication while in or on a motor vehicle for the purpose of hunting any wildlife.

No person while in or on a motor vehicle or a conveyance attached to it shall discharge any firearm at any wildlife while on a public road or a field.

In the Tribal Atlas's that are available for purchase, private Indian owned properties are color coded in yellow and the Tribal owned land are color coded in red. SWO hunt/fish permits are valid on either land with the exception as follows:

No person may hunt, trap or fish any land that is posted by a private individual Indian landowner of such property without express written consent of that individual. If in doubt on a posted or non posted property please check with the SWO Fish & Wildlife Dept. or the Bureau of Indian Affairs at Sisseton Agency.

No game bird may be possessed or transported unless they have one foot, fully feathered head or fully feathered wing attached. Migratory waterfowl must have an attached fully feathered wing or attached head.

Affiliate eligibility: A nonmember employed by the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate or a nonmember employed by a local tribal government, BIA, IHS or a local federal government, which provides services to the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate. Any non member who is enlisted full-time in the US Armed Forces or National Guard is also eligible for affiliate prices.

Tribal member and Indian nonmember youth may hunt entire regular pheasant season with upland or sportsman license

Non Residents: Non residents are not allowed to trap furbearers but are allowed to hunt furbearers.

Trap Checking: Traps including snares must be checked at least every 48 hours, and any animal caught must be removed.

Trap Placement: No traps shall be set within (200) two hundred yards of any occupied house or dwelling, community, town, city limits, public use area, picnic area or other places where public gatherings are likely to take place.

Marking Traps: All traps must be marked with the owners name and address.

Trapping Protected Species: If protected species are trapped, the animal shall be left undisturbed, and the Fish & Wildlife department shall be contacted.

Snares: Snares must have a mechanical lock, swivel device on the anchor end, and stop devices to prohibit the restraint loop from closing to a diameter less than 2 ½ inches. Snares must be stationary and cannot be attached to a drag.

Muskrat Houses: No person may destroy a muskrat house, except that in open season a house may be opened in a manner that will not destroy or damage it as a place of habitation.

Muskrat Houses: No trapping in or on muskrat houses after March 15.

No person shall take or attempt to take any wildlife with the aid or use of artificial light, except raccoons after they have been

treed with the aid of dogs.

Waterfowl license will also validate Non-Indian youth for a 10 consecutive day hunt or two 5 consecutive day periods during regular waterfowl season. The start date(s) will begin on the date you provide and will be printed on your permit. Tribal members and Indian Non-members youth may hunt the entire regular waterfowl season with a waterfowl or sportsman license. Start date may be changed by an SWO F & W licensing agent if the original selected date hasn't started.

Youth must be accompanied by an adult (18+). The adult may not hunt ducks but may participate in the early Canada goose season.

Decoys: Mechanical decoys are allowed on Tribal or Trust Lands. This includes wind driven or battery operated.

Peever Slough: Peever slough is a shoreline waterfowl refuge. No hunting within 100 yards of open water.

Hunter Orange: Youth hunters are required to wear at least one visible exterior garment which covers the chest and back.

Special Requirements: Each hunter must be accompanied by an unarmed adult wearing the required hunter orange.

Hunter Report Cards: All hunters are required to submit a hunter report card within 10 days of the close of the season.

Small game hunters: Small game hunters may not accompany big game hunters in the same hunting party.

Baiting: It shall be unlawful for any person to place any type of salt blocks or licks to attract big game.

Firearm Restrictions: It shall be unlawful for any person to use a shoulder held firearm that produces less than one thousand (1,000) foot pounds of energy at the muzzle. Among calibers *not* legal are : 17 Remington, 218 Bee, .22 Hornet, .25-20, .30 Carbine, .32-20, .38-40, and the .44-40.

Dogs Prohibited: No dogs shall be used in the hunting of big game animals.

Accompaniment Prohibited: No big game licensee while hunting in the field during a big game season shall be accompanied by any non-licensee carrying any firearm or bow and arrow. A non-licensee is a person not having a big game license for the same season.

Safely Handling Harvested Deer

Hunters need to be skilled in many things to successfully harvest deer. However, preparing to harvest a deer does not end once you are able to find a deer and pull the trigger or release the arrow on an animal. There's a popular saying: Once you pull the trigger, the real work begins. Hunters also need to be prepared to properly handle and care for the carcass, so they can process and preserve the meat for the table.

Locate the harvested deer as quickly as possible and remove the entrails, which allows the carcass to cool down and aid in preventing spoilage. Take extra caution to avoid puncturing the stomach or intestines.

Once you get the deer to your vehicle, transport the deer to a local game processor or to your home to process it yourself. The deer carcass must be properly tagged before transporting in any way.

If you plan to process the animal yourself, hang the deer, if possible, to allow air to circulate around the carcass until you are ready to begin the butchering process. Hanging should only be done at 40 degrees or below. Once you have the carcass home, skinning and quartering the animal are the next steps. Continue to be mindful of the temperature and refrigerate the quartered portions if temperatures do not permit hanging.

Deboned pieces can be handled many ways, including tenderized, cut into jerky strips, ground or kept whole for use as roasts. Venison may be canned in a pressure canner, dehydrated or frozen for future use.

Packaging meat with freezer paper or vacuum sealing with plastic can provide your family with venison for months.

Lead bullet fragments in venison has raised concerns about health risks from meat consumption. To help protect against lead contamination:

Consider alternative expanding, non-lead ammunition such as cooper or other high-weight retention lead bullets, such as bonded bullets.

Practice good hunting skills, aiming for the vitals behind the shoulder, or the neck or the head. Do not shoot a running deer.

Take care to avoid processing any meat with excessive shot damage. Trim a generous distance away from the wound channel and discard any meat that is bruised, discolored or contains hair, dirt, bone fragments or grass.

Archery

Tagging and Transporting: The tag received with your license must be signed, dated and securely attached to the big game animal at the time it is brought to a road or into any hunting camp, farmyard, residence, or before it is placed in or on a vehicle. The licensee shall sign the tag and date it by cutting out completely the month and day of the date of kill only. The licensee shall attach the tag securely to the big game animal: (1) Around one hind leg between the hoof and ankle joint; (2) Around the hock tendon directly above the ankle joint on one hind leg; or (3) Around the base of the antler or horn.

Restrictions: A person hunting with bow and arrow may not use or possess any of the following: -Explosive, poisonous, hydraulic or pneumatic points; Crossbows and draw-lock devices that hold the bow at partial or full draw except for individuals who qualify and possess a valid crossbow/draw-lock permit; Arrow rests that have more than three inches of continuous contact with the arrow; Electronic devices mounted to the bow that aid in the taking of game. *However, cameras, video cameras, cell phones used exclusively for photographic purposes, lighted sight pins and illuminated arrow nocks may be used;* Electronic arrow or electronic string releases; Telescopic sights; An arrow without a broad head (fixed or mechanical) that has at least two metal cutting edges when hunting a big game animal, except blunt points may be possessed and used when hunting a turkey. A bow that measures less than 30 pounds pull.

Hunter Report Cards: All hunters must submit a hunter report card within 15 days of the close of the season. Year 2021 archery hunters who did not submit an archery hunter report card will be penalized a \$10.00 penalty fee, that will be assessed to the purchase of their 2022 deer license fee. May submit in office or online at <https://wso.nagfa.net/online>.

Big game decoys: Big game decoys are allowed.

Designated Hunters: Not allowable for Archery season.

Accompaniment Prohibited: No big game licensee while hunting in the field during a big game season shall be accompanied by any non-licensee carrying any firearm or bow and arrow. A non-licensee is a person not having a big game license for the same season and method.

Archers prohibited from possessing firearms: No person licensed in a season restricted to archery only shall possess any firearm in the field while hunting with a bow and arrow.

Dogs Prohibited: No dogs shall be used in the hunting of big game animals.

Federal Lacey Act: No person may transport or ship to another state wildlife taken unlawfully on the Lake Traverse Reservation.

Baiting: No one may establish, utilize or maintain a bait station to attract big game. A bait station is a location where grains, fruits, vegetables, nuts, hay, minerals (including salt) or any other natural food materials are placed or maintained as an attractant to big game animals for the purpose of hunting.

Trail Cameras & Tree Stands/Portable Blinds: Must be labeled with the name & address of the owner or user or must have the current big game license number on the stand or blind. Any equipment left 30 days after close of season will be considered abandoned, and will be ceased by the SWO Fish & Wildlife Department.

Crossbows: Crossbows are not a legal method during archery season except for disabled hunters but does require a special permit.

Rifle Deer (Tahca)

Shooting Hours: ½ hour before sunrise to ½ hour after sunset.

- * **Limit:** (1) Any Deer per each any deer tag or
(1) Antlerless Deer per each antlerless deer tag
(Tribal member elder tags are antlerless only)

Antler Restriction: Must be at least a 3x3 if antlered

Predator Hunting: All hunters who have been issued a rifle deer tag are permitted to hunt coyotes until their deer tag is filled.

Hunter Orange: Hunters are required to wear at least one visible exterior garment which covers the chest and back.

Tagging and Transporting: The tag received with your license must be signed, dated and securely attached to the big game animal at the time it is brought to a road or into any hunting camp, farmyard, residence, or before it is placed in or on a vehicle. The licensee shall sign the tag and date it by cutting out completely the month and day of the date of kill only. The licensee shall attach the tag securely to the big game animal: (1) Around one hind leg between the hoof and ankle joint; (2) Around the hock tendon directly above the ankle joint on one hind leg; or (3) Around the base of the antler or horn.

Tagging allows a big game animal to be transported and stored by the hunter or another person for the hunter. No person may possess in the field or transport a big game animal, including boned out meat unless it is accompanied by the animal's lawfully attached tag along with the animal's head or a hind quarter with visible external sex organs left naturally attached to it. Any person licensed to take "any deer" is exempt from transporting the animal's head or hind quarter with attached sex organs if the lawfully tagged leg accompanies the animal for such a license. However, the provisions of this section do not apply to a big game licensee who transports big game parts, including boned out meat, from the licensee's domicile to another location if the licensee possesses the big game tag or big game license entitling the licensee to the animal. If a person other than the licensee transports big game animal parts (including boned out meat) from the licensee's domicile to another location, the tagged leg or a transportation permit must accompany the items being transported.

Hunter Report Cards: All hunters are required to submit a hunter report card within 15 days of the close of the season. Year 2021 rifle hunters who did not submit a hunter report card will be penalized a \$10.00 penalty fee, which will be assessed to the purchase of their 2022 rifle deer license fee. May submit in office or online at <https://wso.nagfa.net/online>.

Designated Hunters: No Big Game Licensee may hunt for another except designated licensed *Tribal Members* who have obtained authorization by the SWO Fish and Wildlife Department. Designated hunting will only be allowed for Tribal members. Upon authorization the designees name will be printed on the designators permit which must be in possession of the authorized hunter while hunting.

Small Game Hunters: Small Game Hunters may not accompany big game hunters in the same hunting party.

Big game decoys: Big game decoys are allowed.

Baiting: No one may establish, utilize or maintain a bait station to attract big game. A bait station is a location where grains, fruits, vegetables, nuts, hay, minerals (including salt) or any other natural food materials are placed or maintained as an attractant to big game animals for the purpose of hunting.

Firearm Restrictions: It shall be unlawful for any person to use a shoulder held firearm that produces less than one thousand (1,000) foot pounds of energy at the muzzle. Among calibers *not* legal are: 17 Remington, 218 Bee, .22 Hornet, .25-20, .30 Carbine, .32-20, .38-40, and the .44-40. It is illegal to use an auto-loading or self-loading firearm capable of holding more than six cartridges or capable of being operated as a full automatic.

Party Hunting: No more than (20) persons shall cooperate as a group in hunting. When licensee has filled his or her tag they are unable to continue deer hunting with party unless unarmed.

Dogs Prohibited: No dogs shall be used in the hunting of big game animals.

Rifle Deer (Tahca) (continued)

Accompaniment Prohibited: No big game licensee while hunting in the field during a big game season shall be accompanied by any non-licensee carrying any firearm or bow and arrow. A non-licensee is a person not having a big game license for the same season.

Zones: Non Indian Permits are valid only for the zone printed on license.

Zone No. I – *Tribal and Trust lands within the original boundaries of the Lake Traverse Reservation, north of Highway 10 to the North Dakota Border.*

Zone No. II – *Tribal and Trust lands within the original boundaries of the Lake Traverse Reservation, south of State Highway 10 to the point at Lake Kampeska by Watertown.*

North Dakota Lands: Non Members are not allowed to hunt on Lake Traverse Reservation trust lands on the North Dakota side unless a special permit is acquired from the SWO Fish & Wildlife Department through a separate application process.

Shotguns: Must discharge a rifle slug or single ball weighing at least one-half ounce. Buckshot is prohibited.

Trail Cameras & Tree Stands/Portable Blinds: Must be labeled with the name & address of the owner or user or must have the current big game license number on the stand or blind. Any equipment left 30 days after close of season will be considered abandoned, and will be ceased by the SWO Fish & Wildlife Department.

Crossbows: Crossbows may be used by Tribal Members only during the rifle deer season provided they have a current valid rifle deer permit.

Crossbows used shall have a minimum pull of 125 pounds and be equipped with a functional mechanical safety device.

A person that is issued a crossbow/draw-lock permit is entitled to use draw-lock device that holds a bow at a partial or full draw.

The bolts shall be equipped with a broadhead that has at least two metal cutting edges.

Arrows with explosive or poisonous tips are prohibited.

Crossbows with scopes or sights may be used.

It is unlawful to discharge a crossbow from a motorized vehicle.

Hunter Orange is required. Must wear at least one visible exterior garment which covers the chest and back.

Please be mindful of these additional safety tips:

- Crossbows have a safety. Immediately after cocking, always check to make sure that your bow is on safe.
- Always use bolts/arrows recommended by the manufacturer and handle carefully.
- Protect yourself and the arrow points with a covered arrow quiver.
- The safest way to carry, transport and raise or lower a crossbow from a stand is always to have the crossbow un-cocked.
- The safest way to un-cock a crossbow is to fire a bolt into the ground or target.
- Make sure that the limb tips are free of obstructions and your fingers, hand or arm are not in the string path at any time while the crossbow is cocked. Know your range for accuracy.

Mentored Hunt

The mentored hunting program is designed so parents can make the decision on when their child is ready to go hunting for the first time.

MENTORED HUNTER: Any youth at least 10 years of age but less than 16 years of age, that is not required to possess a hunting license as long as accompanied by a hunting mentor while in the field hunting.

REQUIREMENTS: Tribal Members Only

At least 10 years of age and less than 16 years of age

No license required for the mentored hunter

No hunter education class required

Must be accompanied by unarmed mentor

MENTOR: Any parent/guardian or assigned competent adult that accompanies a youth.

REQUIREMENTS:

Tribal Members Only

18 years of age or older

Must be hunter education certified and carry certification in the field during the mentored hunt.

Shall possess a valid hunting license for the game being hunted

Must be in immediate contact and direct supervision of the mentored hunter

If not the parent, must possess written permission from the parent

Adult mentor cannot accompany more than one mentored hunter at any given time

Mentored Hunt (continued)

UPLAND/WATERFOWL/SMALL GAME:

- Mentored hunts involving migratory game birds will require the mentor possess all required licenses
- The combined number of animals taken or possessed by the mentored hunter and the hunting mentor may not exceed the number of animals authorized under licenses held by the adult mentor
- Game taken by a mentored hunter counts towards the mentors daily limit
- May hunt during any of the small game, waterfowl, upland established 2022 seasons
- Hunting party may not exceed six people (including mentors and mentored hunters)

BIG GAME HUNTING:

- If a mentored deer or turkey license is purchased for a mentored hunter, that mentored hunter is ineligible to purchase a license for the respective regular youth deer season
- The purchase of a big game mentored hunting license does not affect the eligibility of the parent/guardian for any other hunting license
- Mentored Deer licensees must follow date and equipment restrictions for the Youth Deer season
- Mentored Fall Turkey licensees must follow date and equipment restrictions for the Fall Turkey season

Hunting party may not exceed six people (including mentors and mentored hunters)

Muzzleloader

Shooting Hours: ½ hour before sunrise to ½ hour after sunset.

Methods: Muzzle loading rifles must shoot a .44 caliber or larger bullet. Muzzle loading pistols are not legal.

Limit: (1) One Any Deer

Hunter Orange: Hunters are required to wear at least one visible exterior garment which covers the chest and back.

Tagging and Transporting: The tag received with your license must be signed, dated and securely attached to the big game animal at the time it is brought to a road or into any hunting camp, farmyard, residence, or before it is placed in or on a vehicle. The licensee shall sign the tag and date it by cutting out completely the month and day of the date of kill only. The licensee shall attach the tag securely to the big game animal: (1) Around one hind leg between the hoof and ankle joint; (2) Around the hock tendon directly above the ankle joint on one hind leg; or (3) Around the base of the antler or horn.

Tagging allows a big game animal to be transported and stored by the hunter or another person for the hunter. No person may possess in the field or transport a big game animal, including boned out meat unless it is accompanied by the animal's lawfully attached tag along with the animal's head or a hind quarter with visible external sex organs left naturally attached to it. Any person licensed to take "any deer," "any elk" or "any antelope" is exempt from transporting the animal's head or hind quarter with attached sex organs if the lawfully tagged leg accompanies the animal for such a license. However, the provisions of this section do not apply to a big game licensee who transports big game parts, including boned out meat, from the licensee's domicile to another location if the licensee possesses the big game tag or big game license entitling the licensee to the animal. If a person other than the licensee transports big game animal parts (including boned out meat) from the licensee's domicile to another location, the tagged leg or a transportation permit must accompany the items being transported.

Hunter Report Cards: All hunters are required to submit a hunter report card within 15 days of the close of the season. Year 2021 hunters who did not submit a hunter report card will be penalized a \$10.00 penalty fee, which will be assessed to the purchase of their 2022 deer license fee.

Small Game Hunters: Small Game Hunters may not accompany big game hunters in the same hunting party.

Designated Hunters: Not allowable for Muzzleloader Season

Muzzleloader (continued)

Wanton Waste: No one may wantonly waste big game.

No person shall abandon edible portions of fish or wildlife at a meat processing plant. The leaving of edible portions of fish or wildlife at a processing plant of more than ninety (90) days shall be considered prima facie evidence of a violation. The owner(s) or operator(s) in charge of any meat processing plant shall report the violation the Tribal Fish and Wildlife Department.

Baiting: It shall be unlawful for any person to place any salt blocks or licks to attract big game.

Accompaniment Prohibited: No big game licensee while hunting in the field during a big game season shall be accompanied by any non-licensee carrying any firearm or bow and arrow. A non-licensee is a person not having a big game license for the same season.

Dogs prohibited: No dogs shall be used in the hunting of big game animals.

Predator Hunting: All nonmember hunters who have been issued a muzzleloader deer tag are permitted to hunt coyotes until their tag is filled. The coyote must be taken by the method the deer tag is issued for.

Baiting: No one may establish, utilize or maintain a bait station to attract big game. A bait station is a location where grains, fruits, vegetables, nuts, hay, minerals (including salt) or any other natural food materials are placed or maintained as an attractant to big game animals for the purpose of hunting.

Non-members are not allowed to hunt on Lake Traverse Reservation trust lands on the North Dakota side unless a special permit is acquired from the SWO Fish & Wildlife Department through a separate application process. These special permits are available on a first come first serve basis. They are limited permits exclusive for North Dakota Trust lands only. Non-member licensees whom were issued regular permits are not allowed to hunt Indian lands on the ND side of Lake Traverse.

SWO tribal member issued licenses are valid for Lake Traverse Reservation trust lands on the ND or SD side.



Lead Based Ammunition

Biologists, doctors and researchers from the science community in 2013 released a consensus statement stating the following: Lead is one of the most well-studied of all anthropogenic toxins and there is overwhelming scientific evidence demonstrating that there is no safe level of lead exposure for children; and

Lead-based ammunition is likely the greatest, largely unregulated source of lead knowingly discharged into the environment in the United States; and

The discharge of lead-based ammunition and accumulation of spent lead-based ammunition in the environment poses significant health risks to humans and wildlife; and


Lead-based ammunition is a significant source of lead exposure in humans that ingest wild game, and people consuming meat shot with lead-based ammunition have been shown to have lead pellets/fragments in the gastrointestinal tract; and

Lead poisoning from ingestion of spent lead-based ammunition fragments poses a serious and significant threat to wildlife, including wild scavenging species such as the bald eagle, golden eagle, ravens and turkey vultures.

Given the overwhelming evidence for the toxic effects of lead in humans and wildlife, even at very low exposure levels, convincing data that the discharge of lead-based ammunition into the environment poses significant risks of lead exposure to humans and wildlife, and the availability of non-lead alternative products for hunting, the Tribal Council of the Sisseton-Wahpeton Oyate of the Lake Traverse Reservation supports the efforts of the Sisseton-Wahpeton Oyate Fish and Wildlife Department (Tribal Council Resolution No.) to reduce or prohibit the use of lead-based ammunition for the take of wildlife on trust lands.

We are asking that all hunters please voluntarily use non lead products for hunting of species that are not yet required by law to be steel shot only. Inquire with the Sisseton Wahpeton Sioux Tribe Fish & Wildlife Department for alternative lead shot recommendations.
